MINUTES

1. CALL TO ORDER

The Regular Parks and Recreation Board Meeting was called to order at 4:38 PM on Wednesday, May 13, 2026.

2. CALL OF ROLL

Present: Lori Olson, Amy Crowell, Anthony Deringer, Leah Cuddeback, Rachel Buchanan

Absent: LeeAnn Linam, Lin Weber

A quorum was established.

3. CITIZENS COMMUNICATIONS

No citizens signed up to speak. The Board proceeded to regular business.

4. MINUTES

4.1. Consider approval of minutes from the April 8, 2026 Regular Parks and Recreation Advisory Board Meeting

A motion to approve the minutes from the April 8, 2026 Regular Parks and Recreation Advisory Board Meeting was made by Rachel Buchanan and seconded by Leah Cuddeback. The motion carried unanimously.

5. CITY STAFF REPORT

5.1. Parks Director Report

Parks and Recreation Director Erica Flocke presented the following updates:

Swim Season: Swim season opened May 1. The first day was affected by minor flooding and cold temperatures, requiring the cancellation and refund of all AM and PM reservations. A subsequent PM closure occurred on May 9 due to lightning in the area. Year-to-date swim

reservations stand at 12,455, compared to 14,596 at the same point last year; however, due to increased pricing, revenue is approximately \$10,000 ahead of last year. The current water level at Blue Hole is 35 inches, up from approximately 29 inches in early April.

Camp Registration: Registration is trailing behind prior-year benchmarks. Nature Camp is at approximately 60% capacity (266 of 440 slots), and Wimberley Summer Camp is at 33% capacity. At the same point last year, Nature Camp was at 84% and Summer Camp at 52%. Staff attributed the decline to increased competition from other local camp programs, including Camp Community and Project Art. Sponsored advertising on Facebook and Instagram has been deployed to boost enrollment.

Road Maintenance and Safety: Staff installed six speed bumps throughout the park—positioned in front of every crosswalk—to address vehicle speeding concerns. All crosswalks and directional arrows were repainted, and new parking stops were installed in the swim lot.

Aquatic Feasibility Study: Several stakeholder meetings have been held with members of the Parks Board, City Council, the YMCA, and Wimberley ISD. A public survey has closed with almost 400 responses received, generating nearly 90 pages of data. Director Flocke indicated she intends to present the full survey results at the next meeting. Board members briefly discussed the absence of a specific question regarding rainwater use, though it was noted the topic appears within written comments.

Programs and Events: Recent programming highlights included Concerts in the Park (over 1,500 total attendees across four concerts, two of which were partially rained out), a sold-out Birds and Brew walk (20 participants), a rescheduled Star Party (approximately 150 attendees), and the Migratory Bird Day Festival (60 attendees). Upcoming May events include Firefly Watch (May 15 and 29), a Community Garage Sale (May 16), Owl Prowl (May 22), a Guided Hike (May 23), and the start of Nature Camp (May 25). The Board was advised that programming activity typically decreases significantly once summer camp begins, with a resumption of regular programming updates anticipated in September.

Blue Hole Nature Center: The project has advanced from the design development phase into the construction documents phase. The building design has achieved an energy net-zero designation, which will be highlighted with dedicated signage. Director Flocke committed to sharing updated design drawings with the Board either at the next meeting or via email prior to that date.

Budget: information will be presented at the June meeting.

Wildlife: Golden-cheeked warbler surveys were conducted twice in April at Blue Hole, with no confirmed sightings during either survey, though the species is heard regularly on the property. A nesting pair of barred owls was also noted on the swim lawn and observed frequently by staff and visitors.

6. DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION

6.1. Discuss regional parks, trails, connectivity, and land acquisition efforts, including Hays County priorities and potential opportunities for collaboration with the City of Wimberley

Karl Flocke, Director of Parks and Natural Resources for Hays County, addressed the Board. He provided an overview of the county's current parks landscape and ongoing efforts, and engaged in an extended discussion with Board members on regional trail connectivity.

Hays County Parks Overview: Director Flocke noted that the county's parks master plan dates to 2011 and is significantly out of date. A request has been submitted within the upcoming budget to fund a new countywide parks master plan. The 2020 countywide parks and open space bond, from which the Blue Hole Nature Center is a recipient, has funded 36 projects countywide, with only approximately half of those funds expended to date. Key county projects include Sentinel Peak Preserve, the Limestone Link Natural Area, Capes Pond Park, and the Hays County Sportsplex. Several projects within the bond program remain partially funded and are largely awaiting TPWD grant awards to close funding gaps.

Sentinel Peak Preserve: Director Flocke reported that construction is actively underway. Demolition is complete, and utilities including water, septic, and electrical lines have been installed. Foundation work is in progress, with pouring expected to begin imminently. Planned structures include an entry guard shack/ticket booth, a main visitor center complex (comprising a visitor center, bathroom facilities, small event space, office and lab space, and maintenance area), and an elevated riverside bathroom facility. Access is planned as day-use reservation only, with operating hours of approximately 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM. Limited overnight use may be permitted for organized groups such as Boy Scouts to honor the site's historical character. Kayaking and canoeing access is intended, subject to river conditions, and a designated swimming area with boat exclusion is planned. The property encompasses 533 acres. Due to its location within the Habitat Conservation Plan area and associated conservation easements, trails will be open for unrestricted public traversal only from September through February; during spring and summer months, trail access will be limited to guided tours with a maximum group size of ten people.

Regional Trail Connectivity: Board members expressed strong interest in regional trail connectivity, noting it as a top priority in the city's parks master plan. Director Flocke discussed active efforts, largely led by the Great Springs Project and Hill Country Conservancy, to advance a regional trail network. The Violet Crown Trail is approaching the northern edge of Hays County and is expected to extend southward toward Austin Water lands. Further extensions toward Ranch Road 12 and connections into Buda and toward McKinney Falls are also under consideration. The county is currently working on a trail easement connecting Hilliard Road through Freeman Ranch and La Cima properties to Ranch Road 12. Director Flocke acknowledged that this regional network has not yet

meaningfully extended toward Wimberley or Dripping Springs, but expressed interest in exploring westward expansion in future discussions with the Great Springs Project.

Board members raised the prospect of a connector trail linking Wimberley to the Freeman Ranch corridor, potentially via the Fulton Ranch Road area. The feasibility of extending the existing hike-and-bike trail network—including completing a sidewalk connection along Woodcreek Drive—was also discussed. Director Flocke indicated that the City of Woodcreek would need to champion that effort within their jurisdiction, and that CAMPO (the Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization) multimodal grants could be a relevant funding mechanism, typically requiring a 20% local match.

The Board noted the existence of a historical Wimberley Valley Trails vision map that has previously informed the city's parks master plan and the Resilient Community Master Plan but expressed difficulty in locating the original source document. Director Flocke suggested reaching out to former county staff member Lon Shell, as well as to Langford (the planning consultant), who may retain copies. The Board expressed consensus that preserving and furthering that regional vision remains a priority and discussed the value of maintaining trail connectivity as a standing item on future agendas to ensure continued focus.

No formal action was taken on this item.

6.2. Discuss, consider and make a recommendation for the Martha Knies Playground Fundraising paver design options and pricing structure

Director Erica Flocke reported that the city's application for an LCRA grant to fund the Martha Knies Playground renovation was unsuccessful, necessitating a community fundraising effort. The total project cost is \$250,000, with \$50,000 already committed by Keep Wimberley Beautiful, leaving a \$200,000 gap to address.

Staff presented a proposed engraved paver fundraising program. The proposed area encompasses approximately 85 square feet of pathway from the main trail to the pavilion at Martha Knies Park, with two additional side arms available to expand capacity if demand warrants. Three paver sizes were presented with the following proposed pricing: small pavers at \$300 each (capacity of approximately 120), medium pavers at \$1,000 each (capacity of approximately 50), and large pavers at \$2,500 each (capacity of approximately 10). Based on this structure, maximum revenue from paver sales within the defined area was estimated at approximately \$111,000. Pavers would be installed by city maintenance staff.

The Board acknowledged that paver sales alone are unlikely to close the full \$200,000 gap and discussed supplementing the effort with direct donations, business partnerships, and potentially city budget funds. Suggestions included creating a dedicated landing page and QR code for the campaign through Friends of Wimberley Parks, allowing donors to either purchase a paver or make a general donation to the specific project. Board members also suggested reaching out to businesses in and around the downtown square—who stand to directly benefit from the park improvement—to explore point-of-sale fundraising such as

register round-ups or percentage-of-sales contributions. The Board noted that the Friends of Wimberley Parks would serve as the fundraising arm for the project.

Regarding paver aesthetics, the Board discussed color and engraving options. Consensus was reached on beige-colored pavers with black engraving. The Board also approved the option to allow clip art on pavers, as offered through the paver vendor's platform.

A motion to move forward with the permeable paver fundraiser for the Martha Knies Park, using beige-colored pavers with black engraving, at the pricing structure of \$300 (small), \$1,000 (medium), and \$2,500 (large), with clip art permitted, and in coordination with Friends of Wimberley Parks, was made by Board Member Lori Olson and seconded by Board Member Rachel Buchanan. The motion carried unanimously.

6.3. Discuss, consider and make a recommendation for approval of engaging MHS Planning to provide grant writing services for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Outdoor Recreation Grant

Director Erica Flocke presented a proposal from MHS Planning to provide grant writing services for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) Indoor Recreation Grant—a \$1,500,000 grant program intended to help fund the Blue Hole Nature Center indoor facility. MHS Planning previously wrote the city's successful TPWD Outdoor Recreation Grant application, which was awarded at \$750,000 and required no upfront payment, with MHS receiving 4% of the awarded amount upon success.

For the current grant cycle, MHS is proposing an upfront retainer of \$11,500, plus 3% of any awarded amount (totaling approximately \$56,500 if the full \$1,500,000 is awarded). Director Flocke noted that, after negotiation, MHS reduced their fee from a higher initial proposal to the current figure. The firm cited the greater complexity and length of the indoor recreation grant application—described as potentially approaching hundreds of pages—as justification for the upfront payment, along with the financial risk they absorbed on the previous engagement.

Several Board members expressed initial concern about the total fee level, and questions were raised about whether competitive bids should be solicited. Director Flocke clarified that the \$11,500 upfront portion falls below the city's bid threshold, and the city administrator confirmed the amount is within administrative purview, though council buy-in was also being sought. It was further noted that the application window opened May 1 and closes August 3, leaving limited time to seek alternative proposals. The Board ultimately accepted that MHS's familiarity with the city's parks infrastructure and prior experience with the same grant program justified the engagement under the current timeline.

A motion to recommend approval of engaging MHS Planning to provide grant writing services for the TPWD Indoor Recreation Grant, at a fee of \$11,500 upfront plus 3% of any awarded amount, as outlined in the presented contract, was made by Board Member Leah Cuddeback and seconded by Board Member Lori Olson. The motion carried unanimously.

7. BOARD MEMBER REPORTS

7.1. Announcements

The next Regular Parks and Recreation Board Meeting was confirmed for Wednesday, June 10, 2026, at 4:30 PM.

7.2. Future Agenda Items

Board members discussed the possibility of a future agenda item related to long-term grant funding strategy and the potential value of identifying a consultant or resource capable of supporting the city's broader grant writing needs across departments. It was noted that this topic may be more appropriate as a city-level initiative rather than a parks board agenda item. Director Flocke indicated she would ensure the standing parks master plan update item returns to future agendas, under which trail connectivity and funding discussions could continue to be addressed.

8. ADJOURNMENT

A motion to adjourn was made by Board Member Lori Olson and seconded by Board Member Anthony Deringer. The motion carried unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:06 p.m.

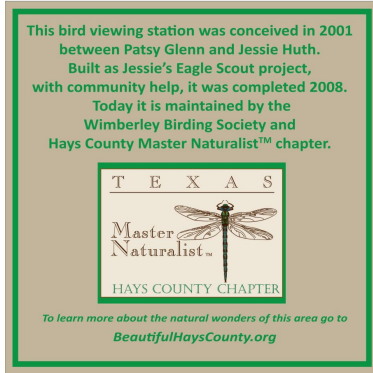

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the City already manages for recreation. Before we commit fully to a traditional pool, I think it's important that we also expand public access to natural water—small-scale, creek-style nature play and wading areas, similar in spirit to the water and creek play spaces at the Austin Nature & Science Center, so people (especially kids and families) can connect with water in a more natural, low-impact way. Ideally, the City would plan and build both types of projects together so our recreational water system is diversified and individual sites like Blue Hole, Jacob's Well, and any new pool are not overwhelmed or overused. Because Blue Hole already reaches capacity and relies on reservations in summer, adding only one large, high-intensity aquatic facility could overload both the environment and our infrastructure; Wimberley is not really suited to gigantic water-park-style projects. Any new facility here should be modest in scale, heavily shaded, water-efficient, and integrated with the existing park system, respecting the limits of our springs, creeks, and roads as development moves forward.

1. As much as we love Blue Hole, it's a bummer having to trek to San Marcos or Austin when we are not able to get a reservation. One more swimming option in Wimberley would be fantastic!
2. I'd only be interested in a public pool if it were saltwater and chilled. With intensifying heat, most public pools are too warm by middle of summer and many people come to the hill country to have an alternative to chlorinated pools
3. Make it happen!
4. I am strongly concerned about water usage!
5. "I was Chairman of a Rotary Club of ElCampo effort to build an indoor Aquatic Center about 15 years ago. We were successful in fund raising to accomplish this and built a very nice 8 lane competition pool, kids pool, 15 person therapy pool and children water play area.

7. "Any new swim facility should be fed by a one-water system including rainwater. Wimberley cannot afford to use well water for this project as we are fighting hard to protect the water we currently have. Every conversation we have is about water for the community. No park facilities - Blue Hole Park or any other existing park should be considered.
8. Include maintenance costs and budget in the plan. Wimberley riparian areas should remain focused o support and protection for the natural world, and community"
9. Please include an endless pool style (so gentle or swift swimming can be in one place without long laps and turning or lanes). I used to swim upstream in San Marcos rio for years, so good for you, then tried blanco & cypress and not good. A few endless pool lanes are smaller, use less water, cheaper, less maintenance, and more efficient than lap lane pools. Not the home type, a pool where entire end pushes water one direction.
10. Since moving to Wimberley, I have missed easy access to a pool for exercise and cooling off on hot days. I go to the Blue Hole when I can but I dislike having to book ahead. If I go to a pool, it's usually on visits to Austin. I think young and old alike would benefit tremendously from having access to a pool here in town.
11. Please seriously consider those in our community who would like a kid-free zone so that fitness can take place. It is also important for our students not to drive daily to get their practice in.

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12. "Make entrance affordable and remember you're serving people who can't afford their own pool, which many have. The price to enter should not exceed what a relatively low income family could afford.
13. Adult nights would also be a peaceful addition."
14. It is important to have a place for kids to learn to swim and experience the fun of swimming in the summertime. We are concerned that there may be thoughts of closing the Blue Hole to swimming permanently. If it remains open, we feel it is a sufficient option. If the Blue Hole is closed, there then needs to be an alternative. However, we do not want to fund a pool that will be used solely to attract more visitors to Wimberley instead of providing an option for local folks. Also, we don't feel that government works well to operate these types of facilities....cost overruns and fraud. What about providing tax breaks or other incentives for a private option that would be run as a business?

23. With the lack of water access for the general public here, this is long overdue!

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24. I've been involved in water conservation for a long time. I grew up with a pool, had access to pools, but even at a relatively young age (early 20s) I recognized that municipalities that have access to natural swimming areas, should find ways to utilize those areas for local youth. I would be interested in knowing what research shows how susceptibility to waterborne bacteria and viruses are worse for humans than the chemicals used to keep pools acceptably clean? As we learn more about chemical affects on human biology, it would surprise me to learn chlorine/bromine are less potentially harmful than naturally occurring matter in fresh water swimming areas. In fact, in the second generation of Purel children who suffer allergies and reactions even us highly allergic people did not tend to suffer as kids, perhaps we're going in the wrong direction entirely?

37. I visited and stayed overnight a week ago; I immediately considered living in the area, but an exercise pool (group water aerobics and lap swimming) year round (heated!) are a hard requirement for me. I would consider this worth sizeable charitable \$upport.
38. Joined DS YMCA just for pool, so LOVE to have one here.
39. A public pool would be a terrific benefit for our community allowing for the opportunity to engage in the health of sun and water within a comfortable medium. It would allow for teens to meet up in healthy ways as well as generate character and physical growth via swim team competitions as well as offering families a place to cool off together, mingle with other families and as well, without having to drive to DS, this will give our senior citizens the opportunity to improve their physical and social health. The natural swimming areas are lovely, but difficult for the very young and the more mature. There is also the pressure of having to beat the crowds and or to reserve a spot removing much of the joy of going for a swim.
40. I live only 9 miles from Wimberely, but am in the Driftwood 78619 area, near 3237 and FM150. I have grandchildren who visit and we have to drive all the way into Austin or Dripping springs and have to buy a membership to be able to swim. I'm very open to buying a membership particularly if it's in Wimberely where I shop and work.

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41. I live in Woodcreek, not Wimberley; but both have a majority of over 50 year old residents who could benefit from the healthy exercise. Woodcreek may be interested in a equitable cost sharing.
42. Yes, you need to consider an indoor pool, especially for adult lap swimming and swim lessons. Heated indoor and outdoor pools. This will promote year around use, especially for older adults that will use the pool for exercise and physical therapy.
43. I would hope that the pool would implement sustainability features, particularly given the water issues in our area.
44. "Learning to swim in an area with lots of natural swimming holes and flash flood potential is a life-saving skill. This skill is not something that is accessible for a large portion of our youth population and a city pool could really level the playing field for ALL families in this regard. It would also provide a safe and fun family space, which is something our town could use. Parks, community spaces, public pools, and things like this are a great equalizer.

56. I live in the City of Woodcreek. The Wimberley area needs a pool! Blue Hole Regional Park has too much land not being utilized. It is the perfect location for it. We also need a skateboard/roller skating area for our klds. Come on!
57. I don't think we can count on spring fed pools when Jacob's Well hasn't flowed in years. Blue Hole has had to close in the past due to stagnation. There is sort of a moratorium on private pool construction due to drought restrictions, and there is no guarantee we will ever get out of drought situations. A sustainably designed swimming pool fed by rainwater and as little groundwater as possible would be a huge benefit for the community in my opinion.
58. Check how many lanes are necessary for competitive swimming competition.
59. I think it would be irresponsible of our community to build a swimming pool in light of the extreme drought we are in. I think if we take better care of the waterways in our area, we'll have plenty of places to swim.
60. I think operations and maintenance on a publicly run community pool will far exceed the reality of our community's budget and I think that we should instead

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- prioritize natural swimming opportunities and facilities. My two older kids are now proficient but my younger daughter is not. Without a pool close by, we haven't been able to get the attention she needs to learn how to swim and be safe around water. From an anthropology standpoint, a pool is a place where all can come and find community despite economic status, language, political stand point, walk of life, etc. It instantaneously brings people together in a way that natural swimming holes cannot. I cannot safely bring all three of my kids to Blue Hole, but I absolutely could to a community pool. Something else to consider is that brining in a pool might actually help people conserve water. Summers here are long, hot and difficult with children. one of my favorite play Therapist always says just add water when it comes to kids. Right now with the restrictions in place we are forced to either break the rules or take our families out of the community in order to seek this out. It is my goal to live here forever. I would love to see my kids play with their friends at the pool. I would love to throw birthday parties there. I would love to build up friendships and memories. I'd love to provide the community with another sporting option that doesn't require a bus trip.

188. In Central Texas small towns (population under ~10-20k), roughly 80% have a public pool or aquatic facility and nearly all have some water recreation (pool or splash pad). This includes - Dripping Springs, Johnson city, Blanco, San Marcos, New Braunfels, Kyle, Buda, Burnet, Lampasas, Llano, Fredericksburg. These towns area also experiencing drought conditions. Let's talk safety - why are we putting undue risk on our HS students every day driving them up and down a two lane road for swim practice? Why are we putting our smallest children in our community on buses to Dripping for public school swim lessons? I understand the argument that we have rivers but rivers are unsafe for small children, not monitored like a pool would be and also not available without admission to the public or on private land. Let's talk water use: Well-managed community pool is far more efficient than a neighborhood where each new home installs its own private pool which is what many homeowners have decided to do/decide to do since there is no free and easy access to water here locally (not in Dripping or Kyle or San Marcos). One shared pool serves ALL of our Wimberley families while avoiding the cumulative water use of dozens of individual ones in private homes. And environmental impact is not just water-focused - think of how many cars (and our buses) drive back and forth to Dripping or other places just to access a pool every day, all year long - reducing all of those cars on the road makes an impact too. Let's talk what the community wants: The community demographics have drastically changed in the past decade - more and more families with diverse needs than previous residents. I hope this is an indication that our city is prioritizing local families' needs and what we've been asking for for years. I and so many other families want a safe, welcoming place where my kids can learn to swim or do things like join a swim team (core memory for me), and meet other families in the summer.

While a public pool sounds wonderful—especially for families and neighbors who cannot drive 15+ minutes to swim—I believe it should only proceed as part of a broader plan to restore and expand safe, equitable access to natural water, protect remaining riparian areas, and right-size new facilities for our town's actual scale. Natural water access is at an all-time low, and we've lost access to some long-loved areas because convenience and short-term economic gains were prioritized over ecological safety and community stewardship. I would like to see this project team weigh, with real transparency, whether a pool is the most ecologically grounded option for strengthening our local economy, or whether smaller, nature-based water projects might provide more benefit with less risk to

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- the watershed. Finally, if we are going to invest in 'listening to the community,' I hope we also invest in community-rooted expertise, compensating local residents and practitioners who deeply understand Hill Country water, culture, and ecology, rather than relying solely on outside firms to interpret our needs for us. That, to me, is what future-focused planning for Wimberley should look like.

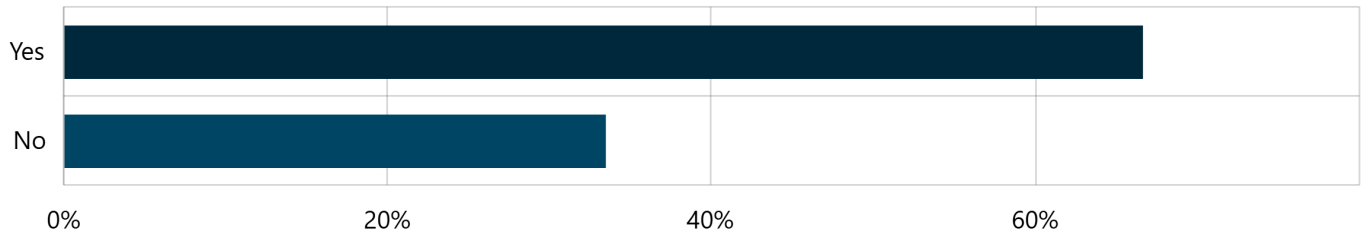

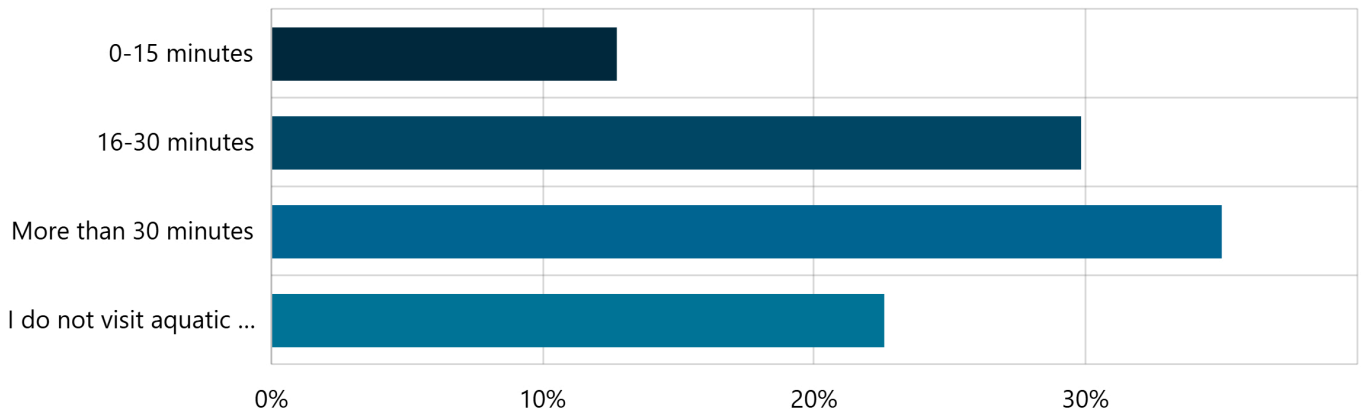

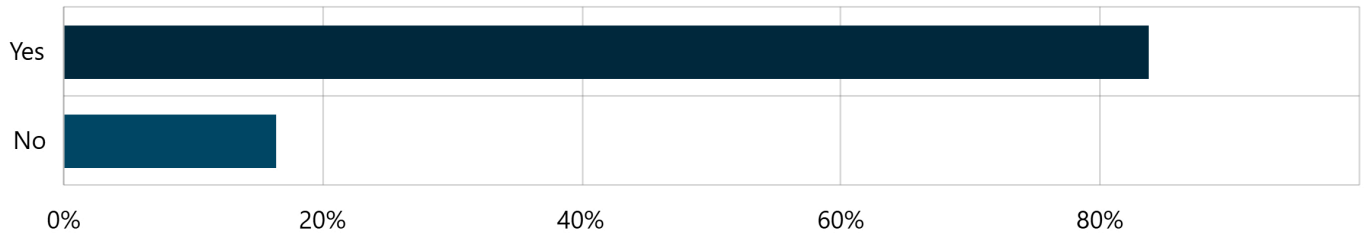

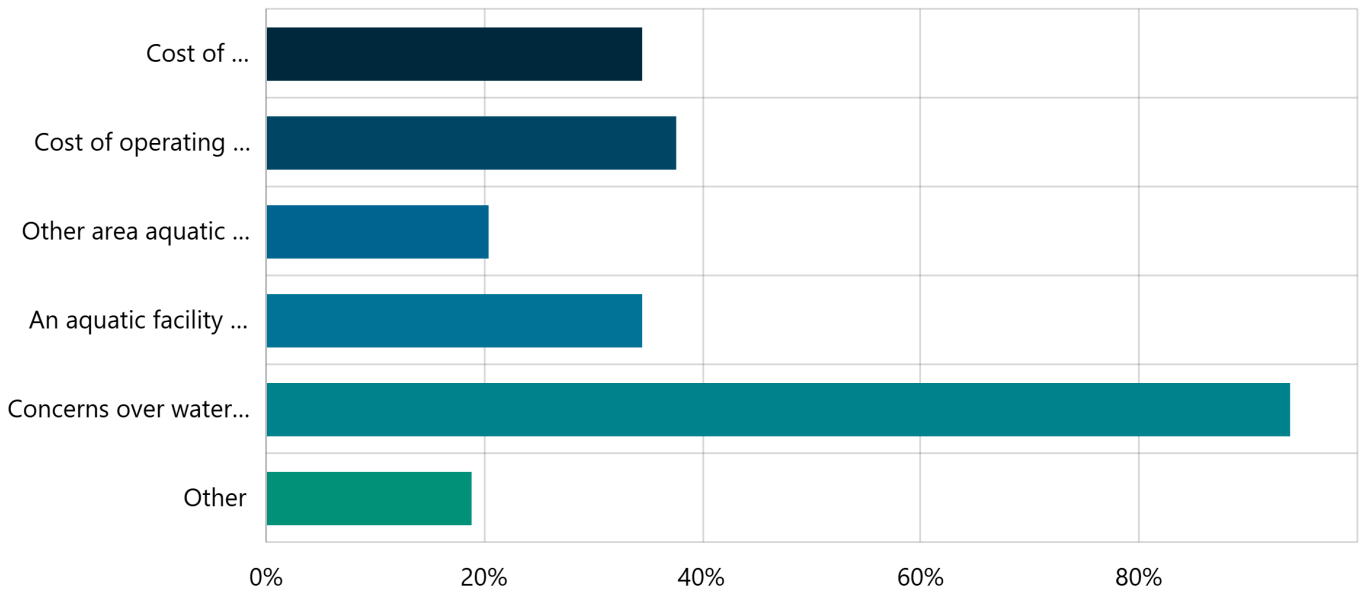

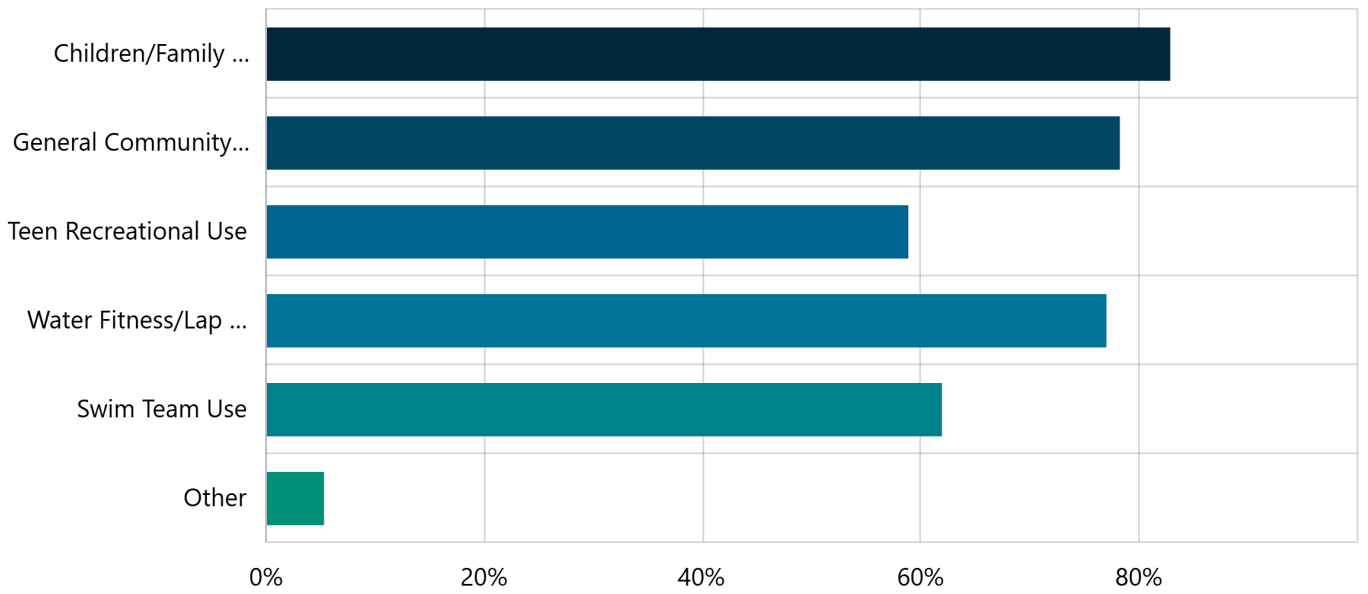

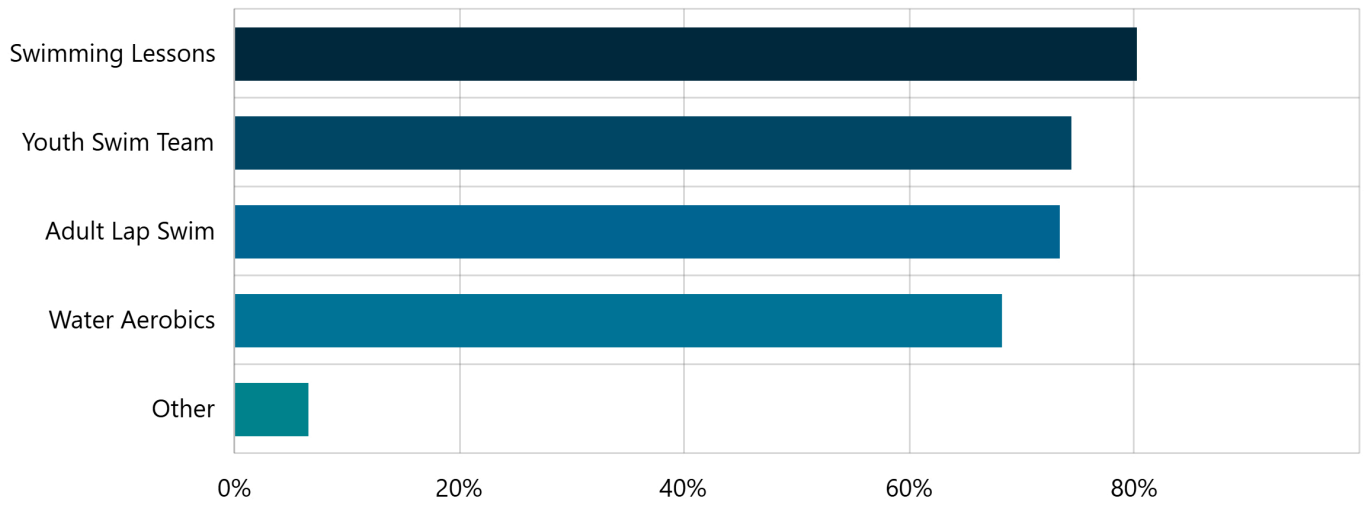

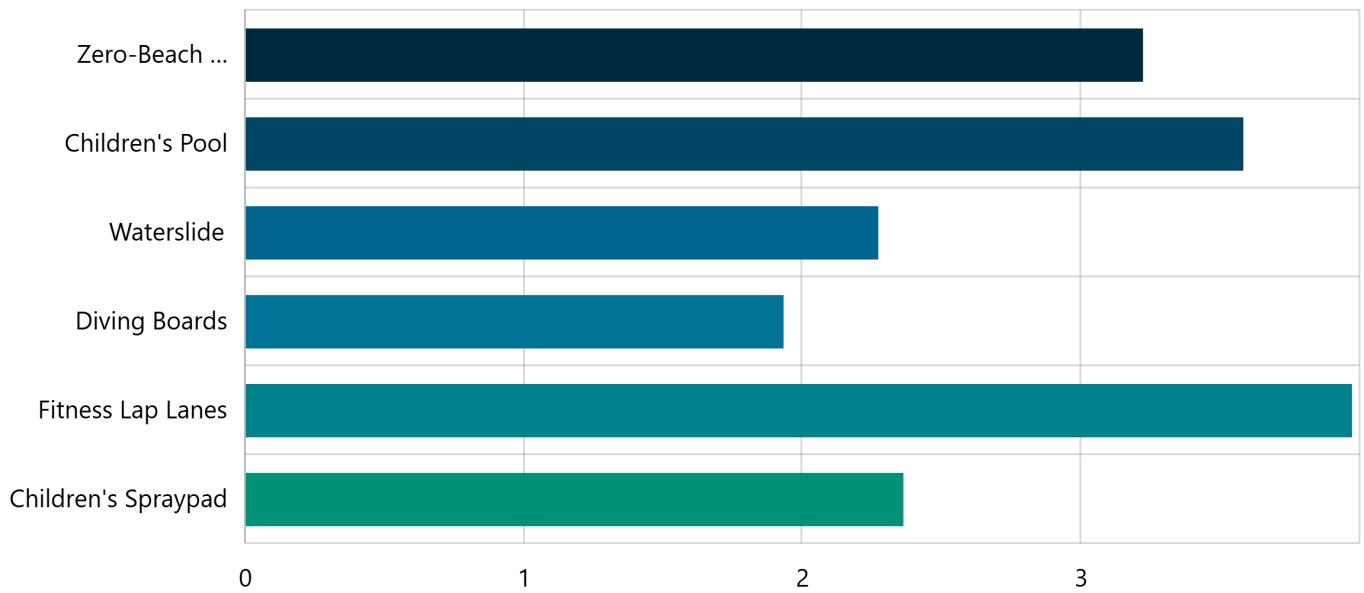

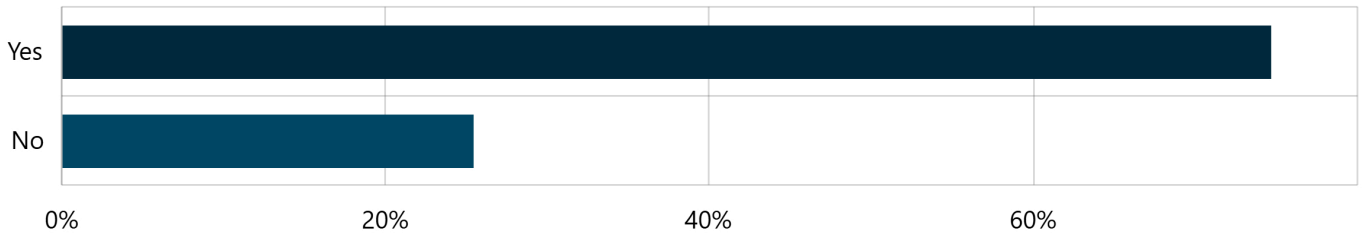

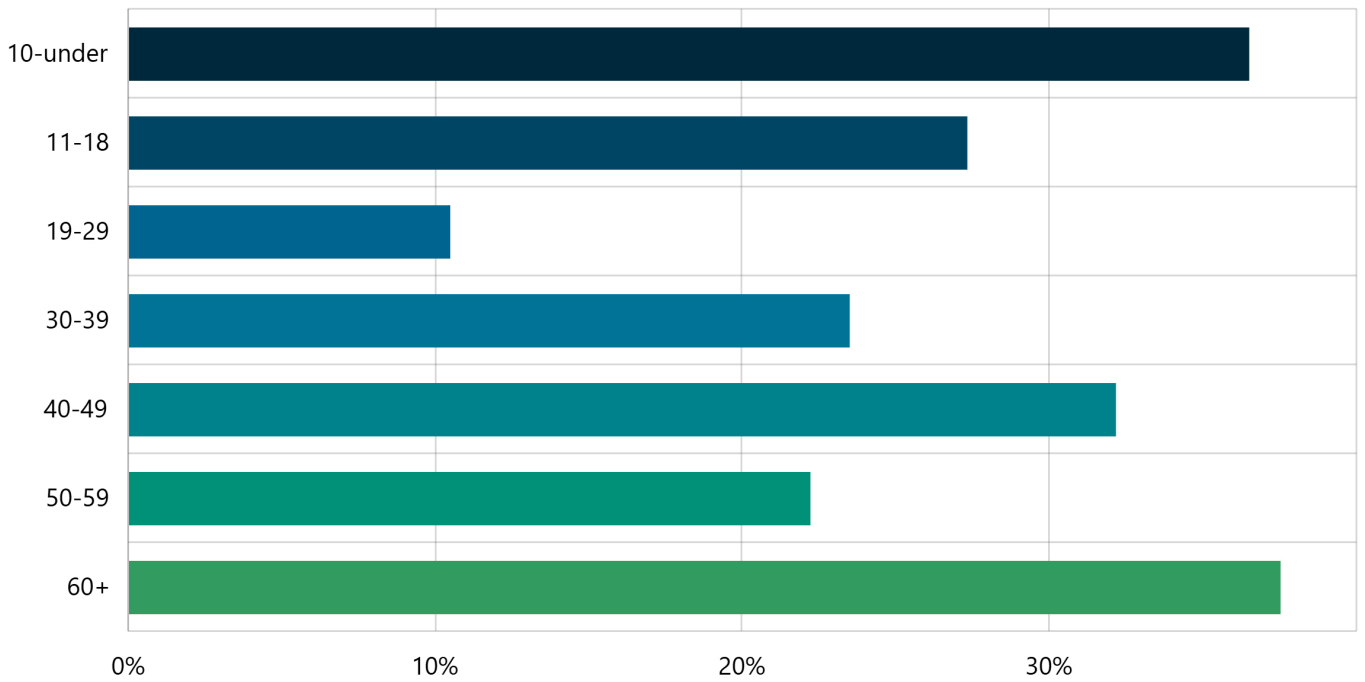

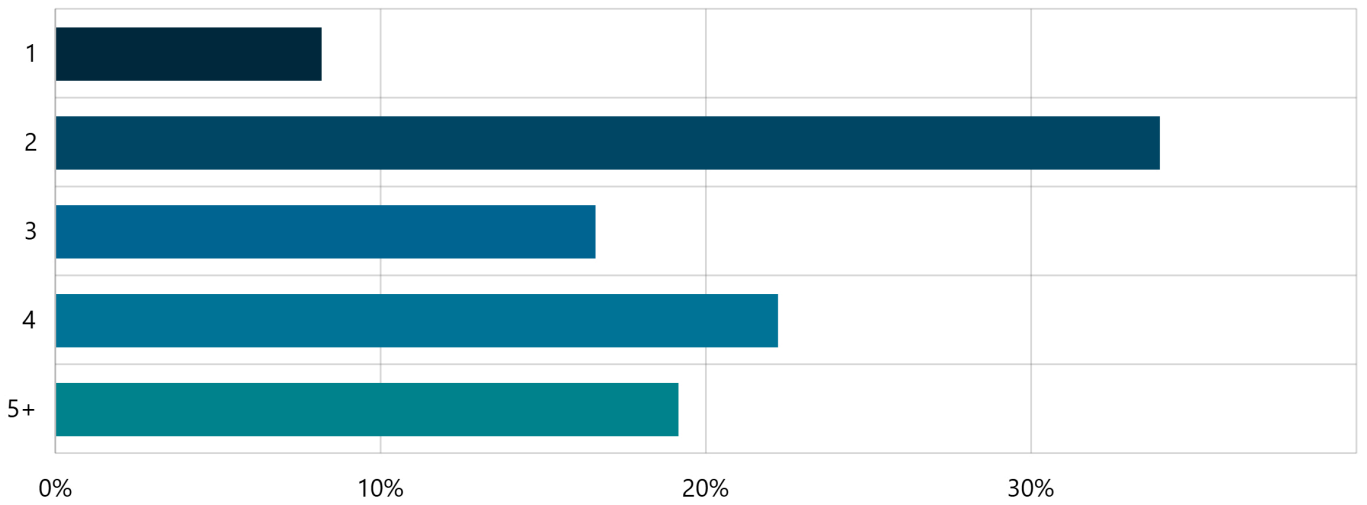
